Barnes Literary Festival

In the week before half term, children from Years 1, 2, 5 and 6 had a fantastic time attending events at the Barnes Literary Festival which was held at the Twickenham Rugby Stadium.

Mrs Chaudry said, "Year 1 had a truly wonderful dinosaur inspired show where they met Simon Mole and Gecko who read poems and sang songs. The children were involved in creating a 'new' kind of dinosaur inspired by every day objects with their new dinosaur being the 'cerealtaur'."



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A small group of children in Year 2, who have had 100% attendance this year, met author Tom Percival at the festival. He read his latest book, *Bea's Bad Day* and taught the children how to draw faces expressing different emotions.
