Key vocabulary

Continent: Continents are large areas of land that cover the Earth's surface.

Countries: Countries are areas of land that are controlled by a single government.

Geographical features: naturally formed features of the earth (rivers, mountains etc)

Human geography: the study of how humans affect/change the earth by building houses & shops, making roads, airports, stations etc

Physical geography: the study of earth's natural features - mountains, rivers, oceans, deserts

Urban: relates to a characteristic of a town or a city.

Rural: relates to the characteristics of the countryside.

Capital city: the city or town which usually serves as the location of the governments central meeting place or offices.

National Park: a protected area of land where only tourism and research is allowed. People do not live in national parks.
